

8th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

(Mt 14:14-22)

Five loaves of bread and two fish

At that time when Jesus came ashore and saw the vast crowd, he had compassion on them and healed those who were sick.

When evening approached, the disciples came up to him and said, "This is a deserted place and the hour is now late. Send the people away now so that they can go to the villages to buy some food for themselves." Jesus replied, "There is no need for them to depart. Give them something to eat yourselves." But they answered, "All we have here are five loaves of bread and two fish." Jesus said, "Bring them here to me."

Then he ordered the people to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. They all ate and were satisfied. Then they gathered up the fragments that were left over—twelve full baskets. Those who had eaten numbered about five thousand men, in addition to women and children.

Then Jesus instructed the disciples to get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he dismissed the crowds.

- Jesus miraculously fed 5,000 people with just five loaves of bread and two fish in this
 verse. This event showcases the divine power and provision of Jesus, as he defies the
 laws of nature to satisfy the hunger of a large crowd. It serves as a powerful testament
 to His ability to provide abundantly even when resources seem scarce.
- Please, pause and reflect on the significance of this miraculous feeding. Jesus shows that
 with faith and trust in Him, there is always an abundance, even in situations where
 human logic would dictate scarcity and lack. This event underscores the importance of
 having faith in God's ability to provide for all our needs, no matter how impossible the
 situation may seem. When we are facing a daunting challenge or feeling like resources
 are limited, we must remember this verses about the limitless power and provision of
 our Lord.
- In a time of need, Jesus takes action to meet that need, which teaches us that we are not
 alone and that we have a Savior who wants to care for us. He uses the resources already
 available to Him in this case, five loaves of bread and two fish to create abundance.
 This can inspire us, showing us that even seemingly small resources in our lives can be
 used for great purposes when entrusted to God. We should be encouraged to bring
 whatever we have to Him. Through faith and action, our little can become much.

From the Acts of the Apostles

Then the apostles and presbyters, in agreement with the whole church, decided to choose representatives and to send them to Antioch with Paul and Barnabas. The ones chosen were Judas, who was called Barsabbas, and Silas, leaders among the brothers. This is the letter delivered by them: "The apostles and the presbyters, your brothers, to the brothers in Antioch, Syria, and Cilicia of Gentile origin: greetings. Since we have heard that some of our number [who went out] without any mandate from us have upset you with their teachings and disturbed your peace of mind, we have with one accord decided to choose representatives and to send them to you along with our beloved Barnabas and Paul, who have dedicated their lives to the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. So we are sending Judas and Silas who will also convey this same message by word of mouth: It is

the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us not to place on you any burden beyond these necessities, namely, to abstain from meat sacrificed to idols, from blood, from meats of strangled animals, and from unlawful marriage. If you keep free of these, you will be doing what is right. Farewell."

And so they were sent on their journey. Upon their arrival in Antioch they called the assembly together and delivered the letter. When the people read it, they were delighted with the exhortation. Judas and Silas, who were themselves prophets, exhorted and strengthened the brothers with many words. After they had spent some time there, they were sent off with greetings of peace from the brothers to those who had commissioned them. (Acts 15:22-33)

This Wednesday, August 6th, is the Feast of the Transfiguration of Our Lord. It is a tradition to bless grapes and other fruits on this special feast day. If you would like to partake in this tradition, simply bring your fruit up to the front of the church, preferably before the Liturgy, and Fr. Mykhailo will bless it during the service.
