

## 10th SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

(Lk: 10:38-42 - 11:27-28)

#### True Blessedness

At that time Jesus came to a village where a woman named Martha welcomed him into her home. She had a sister named Mary who sat at the Lord's feet and listened to what he was saying.

But Martha was distracted by her many tasks. So she came to him and said, "Lord, do you not care that my sister has left me to do all the work by myself? Tell her to come and help me." The Lord answered her: "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and upset about many things, when only one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the better part, and it will not be taken away from her."

While he was speaking, a woman in the crowd called out to him and said, "Blessed is the womb that bore you and the breasts that nursed you!" Jesus replied, "Blessed, rather, are those who hear the word of God and obey it!"

- The incident is intended to teach that the disciples of Jesus must not allow secondary things to take precedence over essentials, namely, the hearing of the Word of God in order to feed on it and put it into practice.
- The happiness of the kingdom of God is open to those who accept the Word of Jesus.
   This is a warning to adversaries who reject it. Thus, the true grandeur of Mary is in having welcomed His message.
- True blessings come from aligning our actions with the teachings of God. We show our
  faith and commitment to following His will in our lives by obeying the word of God. It is
  not enough to passively hear the teachings; we must actively apply them in our
  thoughts, words, and deeds. Imagine the transformation that could occur in our lives if
  we not only listened to God's word but also lived it out daily.

### Say To this Mountain, Move

The disciples seem to me to be in anxiety and fear that they had lost the grace with which they had been entrusted. For they had received power over unclean demons.


So they approached Him in private and asked Him the question, not out of shame (for if the matter had got out and they were criticized, it would have been superfluous for the future to have been ashamed of admitting it in their words) but because what they were going to ask Him was secret and of great moment.

What, then, does Christ say? "Because of your little faith. For truly, I say to you, if you have faith as a grain of mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here

to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible to you." But if you say "Where did they move a mountain?" I will say that they did things much greater than that in raising up innumerable dead. For moving a mountain and moving death from a body are not at all comparable.

After them, other saints, far inferior to the disciples, are said to have moved mountains when necessity demanded. It is clear that the disciples also would have done so had necessity demanded. But if there was never need at that time, do not find fault with them.
